• There have been only 18 cases worldwide so far in 2016 (10 in Pakistan, 5 in Afghanistan, 3 in Laos). There were 56 cases for same period in 2015.

• A new vaccination campaign started in Pakistan on May 16th and will treat 36 million under 5s using a new, more effective vaccine.

## **Building Bridges**

### Reminiscences



Engineers have devised a huge number of bridge designs to span rivers and valleys, roads and railways but very few have been limited to using thin card, pulleys, glue, paper, rubber bands, string and drawing pins!

That was the challenge set by Rotary to 24 teams of 3 or 4 students from Romsey, Mountbatten, Test Valley, St Anne's, Bitterne Park and Woodlands Schools and

to Hamble and Regents Park Colleges. The event was led by Romsey Test with help from the Southampton Magna and Southampton West Rotary Clubs.

In 4 hours the contestants had to design, build and test a roadway bridge strong enough to allow a 1kg weight to pass over it but also able to open to allow a model yacht to pass underneath. Marks were awarded, not just for a successful bridge, but for evidence that they had worked as a team to develop and build their design. The judges were all professional engineers.



Overall winners from the seven senior (Keystage 4) teams were Hamble College with Romsey School coming second.The Junior (Keystage 3) was won by St Anne's Catholic School with teams from Bitterne Park and Romsey Schools tied for second place. Mountbatten were third out of the 17 teams.



The Mayors of Test Valley and Romsey and the Rotary District Governor presented the awards. As was said at the end "This gives a glimpse of how a career in engineering can be satisfying, challenging and fun". For the seventeenth year we invited almost 200 of Romsey's oldest citizens to enjoy "Reminiscences of Romsey.". The Crosfield Hall was filled with beautifully decorated tables loaded with food prepared by the members of Romsey Inner Wheel.



Town crier Terry Hamer, loudly opened the event and led in the dignitaries including the Mayors of Test Valley, and Romsey and MP Caroline Nokes. President Neil Duncan, welcomed guests and reminded them that the event was originally intended to be a one-off to mark the millennium! The entertainment was started by Charles Burnett, (LTVAS) showing photographs and films of events in the Market Place from wartime 1940s scenes to film of Lord Mountbatten opening the Town Hall Council Chamber in 1947 before becoming Viceroy of India. Later was the 1951 pageant for the Festival of Britain and finally the 1977 street party for the Queen's Silver Jubilee. It showed how the Market Place used to be an important point of assembly for the community.

Alison Bailey from Canine Partners then introduced Yarna, a Labrador-cross assistance dog who helps people with physical disabilities. Such dogs help with picking up items to return to the 'patient', removing shoes and even helping someone out of bed and calling the emergency services. The musical entertainment followed with Mountbatten School Junior Choir followed by audience participation in song ranging from "When the Saints go marching in" to "Roll out the Barrel" and ending appropriately with "We'll meet again".



Thanks were also expressed to the local bus and coach company, Wheelers Travel, who generously sponsored the event and to St John Ambulance who were in attendance throughout the day.

### How high is yours?

For the fourth year we set up a Shelterbox tent in the Cornmarket and set about persuading Romsey saturday shoppers to have their blood pressure measured. This effort in partnership with the Stroke Association aims to highlight the increased risk of stokes associated with high blood pressure. We particularly targeted people of working age since those who are older are usually well aware of whether they have high blood pressure.



To attract people's interest Mike Thorne brought along his KR200 Messerschmidt microcar and it seems to have worked as over 100 volunteered of whom 36 were recommended to see their GP. Five were regarded as urgent. The day would not have been possible without the help of Abbeywell Surgery and South Central Ambulance Service.
