Starting the new Rotary year

As you will see from the following items, the weeks since I took up the reins at the end of June have been very busy with the Rotary Wish and Duck Race marketing, leading into the Mayor's Picnic, led by Bill Gidley and his team which, was a fantastic success with even the weather supporting us.

Planning by Greg Hall and his team for the next big event, the "Walk the Test Way" charity fundraising walk on Sunday 6th October goes on throughout the year but is now reaching its climax. We already have over 100 walkers registered who have taken advantage our our early bird discounted registration fee. Over the past decade the walkers have raised around £350,000 for hundreds of charities and their efforts also provide our Club with the funding that it needs throughout the year. Please note the date, as we need your support and input to enable us to run this major event.

Together we can do so much more to support our community and as part of this we are formalising our Friends and Business Partners. And finally a bit of information about me. We seem to have a nautical theme running through our club at the moment . John Gould is an oceanographer and climate scientist and I also have a marine background. I joined BP as an Engineering Cadet Officer and after serving at sea for eight years I moved on to ship inspection and energy conservation projects. This was followed by being part of the management team that set up the International Oil Spill Response Centre in Southampton. After the Exxon Valdez oil spill in Alaska, I was based in the USA for three years developing and overseeing oil pollution response and crisis management procedures. On return to the UK, I co-ordinated global crisis management response for BP. This excluded North America but involved travelling extensively to operations in South America, Australasia, Africa, Europe, former Soviet Union, Middle East and Indochina. I am now retired and thinking that going back to work might be more of a rest!

Know your Blood Pressure, April 20th

In conjunction with the Stroke Association, the Romsey Opengate Stroke Club, and doctors from a Romsey practice we measured people's blood pressure in the Cornmarket and raised awareness of the factors that increase the risk of strokes.



The results surprised everyone. Of the 140 measurements taken, 30% had blood pressure that suggested they should consult their GP and of these about a third were thought to require urgent intervention. Plans are now in place to repeat the exercise next year.

Quick action can save lives. Remember F-A-S-T

Face – Does one side of the face seem to droop?

Arm – Does the person find it difficult to raise both arms?

Speech – Is it difficult or slurred?

Time – If these symptoms are present, dial 999.

Working with young people

for a day of fun. The event is known as Kids Out, and our Club takes children from Great Oaks School in Southampton and treats them to a day at Paulton's Park. On June 12th they joined a total of 1300 special needs children from around the Rotary Wessex area together with an almost equal number of helpers.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards



During May the Youth Opprtunities committee interviewed pu-

pils from Romsey school to select two who will join the RYLA weekend 19-21 July. One boy and one girl were the two successful candidates and both have agreed to talk to the Club about their experience. As a consolation prize the boys who were runners up will have a day's activity at the Cobnor Activities Centre near Chichester.

Enrichment Day



Mountbatten School held their first Enrichment Day on June 14th during which Year 9 students are given a glimpse of possible career options that they might pursue The Club were invited to take part and four members each gave 10 minute talks about careers at sea, in medicine, on being a solicitor and careers in optometry.

The day was thought a great success by teachers and students alike and there are plans to repeat it next year.

Young Enterprise

The following week Romsey School students took part in Young Enterprise week. This involves the whole of the pre-GCSE year working in groups to develop business proposals to present to three local business people, rather like the TV programme 'Dragons Den'.



The winning teams then develop the idea further and market their idea in Romsey Town Centre to see how much money the idea generates.

Rotary Dentaid Boxes

Landford-based charity Dentaid in partner-ship with our Club has developed what is effectively a simple dental surgery (chair, solar powered suction unit and light plus tools and materials to carry out extractions and fillings) all housed in a wheelie bin. Each Rotary Dentaid Box costs £1500. On June 19th Dentaid was visited by members of the Rotary Club of Calcutta Central who expressed considerable

interest in the project. A cheque for £500 was donated to Dentaid by the Rotary Club of Winchester who were hosting the Calcutta group. Seven Dentaid boxes are awaiting shipment to Africa in August and we are also waiting to hear the outcome of a bid for funding from Rotary International that will send a dental team and 12 boxes to give dental care in Timor Leste.

Rotary and the global fight against polio



Rotary has been a leading force in the fight to eradicate polio. When the campaign started in 1988 it was endemic in 125 countries with 350,00 cases reported annually. It is now endemic in only three countries, Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria and there has been a recent new outbreak in Somalia. In 2012 there were only 91 cases.

Initially Rotary was in partnership with the World Health Organisation and since 2007 there has been additional support from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation that gave Rotary a \$100 million grant for polio eradication, increasing it to \$355 million in 2009. Rotary agreed to raise \$200 million by June 2012 and when that goal was reached six months ahead of schedule, the Gates Foundation granted Rotary an additional \$50 million.

Last month Rotary and the Gates Foundation announced that their partnership will be extended for the critical last phase of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. The Gates Foundation

dation will match 2 for 1 every dollar Rotary worldwide commits up to US\$35 million to polio eradication through 2018.

This autumn our Club will once again plant daffodils and purple crocuses around Romsey as a reminder of this campaign to which our club contributes. (The purple colour reminds us of the dye that has marked the fingers of the millions of children who have been immunised in the campaign.)

About our Club and about Rotary

The Rotary Club of Romsey Test was started in 1990 and presently has 55 members. The Club was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Romsey (the lunchtime club) that meets on Tuesday lunchtimes at the White Horse hotel. We are part of Rotary International (www.rotary.org) and Rotary International of Britain and Ireland (www.ribi.org).

Rotary's objectives and principles are :-

- The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- High ethical standards in business and professions;
- · Service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace.

Our club is overseen by its Council made up of the Chairmen of the Club's committees, Secretary and Treasurers.

The Clubs committees are

- Club Service responsible for the running of the club.
- Community Service dealing with service to the local
- Fund-raising primarily focussed on our major fundraising event, Walk the Test Way.
- Youth Opportunities focussed on our work with young people around Romsey
- International dealing with our international giving and including our partnership with Dentaid to produce the Rotary Dentaid Box.
- Foundation Rotary Foundation is Rotary's own charity and deals with such global projects as the eradication of polio

Friends and Business Partners

We continue to develop our Friends and Business Partners scheme. The Club has joined the Romsey and District Chamber of Commerce and we are in discussion with a number of local businesses to join our scheme. This quarterly Newsletter is one of our means of keeping to touch with individuals and organisations with whom we collaborate.
